This memorandum describes the 2008 San Mateo County Housing Needs Study (2008 Housing Needs Study) conducted by Economic & Planning Systems, Inc. (EPS) for the City/County Association of Governments of San Mateo County (C/CAG) and the County Department of Housing. The 2008 Housing Needs Study represents an update to the prior 1998 and 2006 Housing Needs Studies. The 2008 study provides additional information on housing need to each of the San Mateo County cities and the County as they prepare their respective Housing Elements. As described below, this study is not a replacement or alternative to the official Regional Housing Needs Allocation (RHNA) housing needs estimates. Rather, it is intended as a complement, providing a distinct economic development-based housing needs estimate for each jurisdiction.

This memorandum is divided into three sections. The first describes the background to this 2008 Housing Needs Study and describes the difference between this 2008 study and both the prior 2006 Housing Needs Study as well as the current RHNA allocations. The second summarizes the results of the 2008 Housing Needs Study and the third describes the methodology behind the 2008 Housing Needs Study.

BACKGROUND

2008 STUDY UPDATE

In 1998, EPS prepared a San Mateo County Housing Needs Study for C/CAG as an adjunct to the San Mateo County Countywide Transportation Plan Alternatives report. The Countywide Transportation Plan report found that increases in local housing supply could reduce congestion on the County's freeways and major arterials. The 1998 Housing Needs Study evaluated the link between County job projections and housing need, considered the ability of current land use designations to fulfill this housing need,

In 2006, EPS published an updated San Mateo County Housing Needs Study for the C/CAG, the San Mateo County Department of Housing, and the Housing Endowment and Regional Trust (HEART). The 2006 study estimated countywide housing need between 2005 and 2025 based on the Association of Bay Area Governments' (ABAG's) 2005 job projections. The results of the study were also summarized in the "Housing Our Future" document published by the County Department of Housing.

Between 2006 and 2008, ABAG published a revised set of job projections in their 2007 ABAG projections report. In addition, the prior studies, both 1998 and 2006, only evaluated housing need at the countywide level. As a result, C/CAG and the County Department of Housing commissioned EPS to refine and update the 2006 study to make it more applicable to the Housing Element updates currently underway in all cities and towns in San Mateo County. Specifically, EPS was asked to develop new housing needs estimates based on the latest job projections (ABAG Projections 2007) for the Housing Element period 2007 to 2014 with separate estimates for each of the 21 jurisdictions. The methodology used in the 2006 and 2008 studies is the same, the only difference being the more current ABAG job projections. Key differences between the results for the 2006 and 2008 housing need estimates are described below:

- **Job Projections**. The 2008 Housing Needs Study focuses on the Housing Element period of 2007 to 2014. ABAG Projections 2007 estimated a job increase of about 38,500 jobs over this period, about 5,500 jobs each year. The 2006 housing needs study focused on the 2005 to 2025 period and, based on ABAG Projections 2005, had a higher projection of job growth in San Mateo County with an estimated job increase of about 133,300 jobs or about 6,700 jobs each year.
- Overall Housing Need. The 2008 Housing Needs Study estimates a total Countywide housing need of 20,400 housing units between 2007 and 2014, an average of about 2,900 units each year. The 2006 Housing Needs Study estimated a total housing need of 72,900 units between 2005 and 2025, an average housing need of about 3,600 units each year. The lower annual housing need under the 2008 study is a direct result of the lower ABAG average annual employment projection in 2007 than in 2005.

RHNA CONTEXT

The RHNA allocations prepared by ABAG through a State-mandated process overseen by the State's Housing and Community Development Department are distinct and different from the Housing Needs Studies conducted by EPS for the County. ABAG's RHNA allocation process was developed with input from Bay Area jurisdictions and is intended to represent a blended estimate of existing and future housing need. ABAG's current RHNA process is described in its "San Francisco Bay Area Housing Needs Plan, 2007 to 2014." The methodology used for this allocation estimates housing need based

on a number of steps and a broad range of factors. To develop regional housing need, this methodology considers State Department of Finance and ABAG regional population growth projections, ratios between housing units and population, and an allocation for existing housing need based on vacancy rate assumptions. This regional housing need is then distributed between jurisdictions based on a weighted combination of ABAG housing projections, ABAG job projections, existing job counts, and transit-oriented development capacity for each jurisdiction. Housing need is separated by income group based on 2000 income distributions and certain adjustments are made based on differences in individual jurisdictions' income distributions from the relevant countywide average.

San Mateo County is unique in the Bay Area in that it chose to form a housing needs allocation subregion which gave it more control over its housing allocations to the cities and the unincorporated County. The overall approach taken by the County and its jurisdictions was similar to that used by ABAG, though it included a number of mutually agreed upon adjustments in the RHNA housing needs allocation. On May 15, 2008, ABAG published its adopted RHNA allocations by Bay Area jurisdiction for 2007 to 2014, including all cities and counties. The RHNA allocations include total housing need by jurisdiction and a breakdown of housing need into four income categories: very low, low, moderate, and above-moderate.

As discussed in more detail below, the housing needs estimates in the 2006 Countywide Housing Needs Study and this revised 2008 city-level housing needs analysis project housing need based on projected job growth. Under this approach, the estimated housing need in San Mateo County and in each City is linked directly to projected job growth, associated new worker household formation, expected commute patterns, and estimates of non-worker household formation. The housing needs study does not take account of housing development capacity under current land use designation in the County or the Cities. The distribution of housing need by income group is based on worker incomes and household formation patterns. The results of the 2008 housing needs analysis do not represent an alternative to the RHNA allocations, but rather represent a different housing need estimate from a different perspective and provide a useful point of comparison.

The key differences in the results between the RHNA allocation process and the 2008 housing needs study are described below and shown in **Table 1** and **Figure 1**:

- Countywide Housing Need. The total housing need under the RHNA allocation for San Mateo County is 15,738 units. The 2008 job-based housing needs estimate total about 20,400 units, a difference of over 4,600 units or about 30 percent (see Table 1).
- City Comparison. Most jurisdictions in San Mateo County show higher housing needs estimates under the 2008 Housing Needs Study than under the RHNA allocation. Jurisdictions where the RHNA allocation is significantly higher than the 2008 housing need study estimates include the cities of San Mateo, East Palo Alto, and Half Moon Bay (see Table 1).

• **Income Level Distribution**. The 2008 housing needs study and RHNA allocations have somewhat different housing need allocations by income group. Both estimates show similar, but varying, allocations by jurisdiction. Taking the County as a whole, as shown in **Figure 1**, the RHNA allocations show a lower percentage of housing need at the very low and low levels and a higher percentage at the moderate and above moderate levels than the 2008 housing needs analysis.

2008 HOUSING NEEDS STUDY FINDINGS

Key findings of the 2008 housing needs analysis include the following:

- Between 2007 and 2014, San Mateo County is expected to add about 38,500 jobs based on ABAG 2007 projections. This job growth represents an average annual increase of 5,500 jobs and an average annual job growth rate of 1.5 percent (see Table 2).
- **Job growth is expected to occur in a number of industry sectors**. The professional and managerial sector is projected to experience the largest absolute growth of around 7,400 jobs, or about 20 percent of new job growth, with the health and educational services sector adding the next most at about 6,200 jobs or about 15 percent of job growth (see **Figure 2**).
- This job growth is expected to result in the formation of 19,500 new worker households, with a net increase of 13,700 new worker households in San Mateo County. The difference between the overall worker household formation and the net new worker household in San Mateo County is due to the projected increase in net in-commuting in the County (see Figure 3).
- In addition to the new worker households, an additional 6,300 in non-worker households are expected to be formed, likely driven by the retirement of current workers. This estimate of new non-worker households is based on historic ratios between worker and non-worker households and may, therefore, be conservative given that the impending retirement of the baby boom generation is likely exceed historic rates of retirement.
- The total new housing need in San Mateo County between 2007 and 2014 is estimated at about 20,400 housing units. This includes the total new household formation in San Mateo County of about 20,000 households adjusted by the current vacancy rate to estimate housing need in units.
- The Countywide housing need is estimated to include 15 percent extremely low, 12 percent very low, and 20 percent low income households. This division is based on the 2000 income distribution adjusted by the consumer price index and the current HUD housing income limits for San Mateo County.

• The housing need estimates by local jurisdiction are shown in Tables 3 through 7. The estimates vary based on the ABAG job projections for 2007 to 2014. The estimates are by City boundaries with all job growth outside of city limits included together in the unincorporated housing need estimate (see Figure 4).

2008 HOUSING NEEDS STUDY METHODOLOGY

The methodology used in this 2008 housing needs analysis employs the same methodology as the 2006 Countywide Housing Needs Analysis. The primary differences are the use of the latest 2007 ABAG job projections, the focus on the Housing Element period of 2007 to 2014, and the applications of the housing needs model at the City level. The first part of this section describes the Countywide housing model. The second part describes its application to individual cities.

COUNTYWIDE MODEL

The housing needs model includes estimates of new worker households by income group associated with new job growth and estimates of new non-worker households based on past relationships between worker and non-worker households. The key steps in housing needs model include the following:

- EPS used ABAG 2007 job projections to estimate 2007 to 2014 job growth. ABAG reports job projections for 2005, 2010, and 2015. The 2007 and 2014 job projections were derived as proportions of the job estimates for these years. The ABAG job projections are shown in **Table A-1** with a total projected job growth of about 38,500 jobs for San Mateo County.
- In order to convert ABAG job projections by industry into Census industry groupings, EPS developed a matrix detailing the correspondences between ABAG and Census industries (see **Table A-2**). The resulting job distribution by Census industry category is shown in **Table A-3**.
- Table A-4 shows the distribution of jobs by industry into occupational
 categories. These relationships were derived from the 2000 Census data for San
 Mateo County. Applying this distribution to the job projections results in the
 distribution of jobs by industry and occupation shown in Table A-5.
- The conversion between new jobs and new worker household formation is determined based on the propensity of workers in different industry/occupation groupings to represent the head of household/householder. The head of household is defined as the person in whose name the house is owned or rented. There is only one head of household per household. **Table A-6** shows the proportions of workers in each industry/occupation that represent the head of household. Applying these proportions to the job projections results in the

distribution of head of households shown in **Table A-7**. As shown, a total of about 19,500 new households are associated with the new job growth in the County.

- The 2000 Census provided information on household income distributions for heads of households in different industry/occupation groupings. It is assumed that household incomes in San Mateo County increased at the rate of inflation as measured by the consumer price index. This inflated income distribution data was then compared to the current HUD affordable housing categories for San Mateo County to determine the current household income distribution for these income groups. The HUD income groups include extremely low, very low, and low for 3-person households as well as median income and moderate income (estimated at 120 percent of median). **Table A-8** shows the household income distribution.
- **Table A-9** shows the results of applying the household income distribution to the head of worker household formation estimates. The overall worker household income distribution results in 7 percent workers households in the extremely low income group, 11 percent in the very low income group, and 20 percent in the low income group. Of the remainder, 19 percent are forecast to earn less than 120 percent of median income and 43 percent more than this income level.
- As of 2000, the numbers of County in-commuters and out-commuters were relatively balanced. In other words, the number of housing units occupied in San Mateo County by individuals working outside of the county approximately equaled the amount of housing provided by other counties for San Mateo County workers. This is expected to change in the future, with the Metropolitan Transportation Commission (MTC) projecting a significantly increased level of net in-communing into San Mateo County. Based on MTC's projections, considering both new job growth in San Mateo County and elsewhere, other counties are expected to cover, in net terms, about 29.5 percent of San Mateo County's job-related housing needs. As a result the new household formation projections were discounted by this percentage to arrive at estimates of net new worker household formation in San Mateo County. Table A-10 shows the resulting estimate of net new worker households in San Mateo County, about 13,700 new households.
- To develop estimates of total housing need, EPS estimated the ratio of worker households relative to non-worker households in San Mateo County in 2000 by income group, as shown in **Table A-11**. This same ratio was assumed to continue through the 2007 to 2014 period. Given the large number of persons close to retirement, the estimate of non-worker households may be conservative.
- Table A-12 shows the estimates of total new housing need in San Mateo County for the 2007 to 2014 period. This estimate is based on the application of the worker to non-worker household ratios to the estimates of worker households and then the incorporation of a vacancy estimate to convert from new household

formation to number of housing units needed. As shown the total estimate is about 20,400 housing units. These units include 15 percent for extremely low income households, 12 percent for very low income households, and 20 percent for low income households.

JURISDICTIONAL MODEL APPLICATION

The Countywide housing needs model was applied to each of the 20 cities in San Mateo County in addition to the unincorporated County. Key components of the model application include:


- ABAG 2007 projections for the 2007 to 2014 period by industry were evaluated for each jurisdiction.
- Key relationships were assumed to be the same for the cities as for the County, including relationships between industry and occupation, household incomes by industry/occupation group, and ratios between worker and non-worker households.
- The same core model is applied to determine the specific estimates of new housing need by income group for each of the jurisdictions.
- The core tables of the model for the City of San Mateo, as an example, are shown in **Tables B-1** through **B-5**. Overall results by City were summarized in **Tables 3** through 7 above.

San Mateo County Housing Needs Assessment; EPS #18038







San Mateo County Housing Needs Assessment; EPS #18038




